


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INTRODUCTION

In total, over 4 billion GEL were expended by contracting authorities in 2018 for the procurement of goods, services and infrastructure construction works. The main duty of the State Procurement Agency (hereafter SPA) is the creation of necessary environment for ensuring the transparent and efficient disbursement of these funds in a competitive manner. To this end, the SPA continuously improves the legal framework, and eProcurement system of public procurement, also implements diverse targeted programs to retrain procurement specialists, employed in public sector.

Last year the fundamental reform was accomplished in the light of conducing centralized, the so-called "consolidated" tenders. With a view to saving budgetary resources and enhancement of procurement efficiency Resolution N446 of the Government of Georgia (29 August, 2018) provided for the conduct of centralized procurement with regard to certain types of procurement objects as a mandatory requirement.

The conduct of centralized procurement procedures was delegated on the State Procurement Agency, to what end the specialized structural unit, staffed with duly qualified personnel - the Department for Centralized Procurements - was created.

It should be mentioned that the application of centralized procurements is a well-established practice in the EU Member States. The advantage of this type of procurement is that the aggregation of small-volume, identical procurements allows for making economy of scale on the one part and to reduce the share of unsuccessful tenders and ruling out of potential corrupt transactions, on the other.

It is noteworthy that during the past years several major amendments were introduced into the legal framework regulating public procurement for the reduction of the share of simplified procurement. In 2018 the share of simplified procurement in overall procurements was reduced to 19% and the volume of such procurements amounted to approximately 779 million GEL. Just to compare - in 2017 the volume of simplified procurements amounted to 881 million GEL and in 2016 - to 1.5 billion GEL.

In 2018 Order N9 (20 September, 2018) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency was issued On Amendment of Order N13 (17 August, 2017) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency on Approval of the Procedure of Determination of the Criteria of Simplified procurement and Holding of Simplified procurement, which Order tightened the criteria for holding simplified procurement conditioned by urgent necessity. The foregoing will promote further decrease of the number of simplified procurement in the future.

One of the major duties of the SPA is retraining of procurement specialists of state procurement entities. During 2018 total 315 trainees from all the regions of Georgia were trained by the SPA Training Centre within the framework of special training program. Furthermore, the SPA experts arranged 5 on-the-spot, targeted meetings with municipality Mayors and 13 training for public procurement specialists. In total 816 trainees were retrained during the last year within the framework of various training activities.

KEY DATA INDICATORS OF GEORGIAN PUBLIC PROCUREMENT

In 2018 the net value of public procurements amounted to 4,087,214,400 GEL . Of them, procurements for 3,308,643,197 GEL were conducted through electronic procedures and the value of contracts executed through simplified procedures made 778,571,203 GEL




Diagram N1: Net Value of Public Procurement Contracts

Simplified procurements do not include procurements through special procedure. The volume of simplified procurements are calculated for procurements funded by resources allocated in 2018, what includes contracts uploaded in 2017 and at the beginning of 2019 as well.

In total 32,597 tenders were announced in 2018, what is 2% (33,095) less than similar showing for the past year. Distribution of tenders announced in 2018 according to their type is shown on Diagram N2.

As in 2017, the reduction of the number of announced tenders is conditioned by their aggregation.


Table N1 below demonstrates the quantities of announced tenders translated in amounts. These figures can also be seen on Diagram N3. As demonstrated by the Diagram, the number of announced low-value tenders (e.g. 10,000 GEL and less) was higher in 2017, than in 2018. At the same time, the Diagram evidences, that the number of large-scale tenders is higher in 2018 as compared with 2017 (the number of tenders announced in 2018 with estimated value 100,000 GEL and over is 10% higher).

Diagram N3: Quantities of announced tenders in the light of monetary showings



As of data for 2018 net contract value of e-tenders amounts to 3,017,455,945 GEL, which amount exceeds same showing for the past year by $18\%^1$.

Notable is the sharp growth in e-tenders without auction (sealed bid auction). In total 21,255 NAT tenders were announced in 2017 (there were 15,627 NAT tenders in 2017) while 10,082 SPA tenders were announced for the same period.

In 2018 the final status was awarded to 31,643 tenders within the Unified Electronic System of State Procurement², of which contracts were awarded with regard to 23,074 tenders (24,215 in 2017). As a result, the tenders with "Contract Awarded" status accounted for 73% of all tenders with final statuses.




Diagram N5: Distribution of final statuses, awarded to tenders in 2018

The data do not cover GEO and DEP tenders, consolidated tenders, but cover trading with a pricelist.

In 2018 net estimated value of tenders with final statuses amounted to 3,196,112,945 GEL³, and the economy totaled 285,736,820 GEL.

Distribution of savings in public procurement field in 2018 is given in the table.


Diagram N6: Distribution of tender values in 2018 and economy according procurement objects


Diagram N7: Distribution of the number of tenders, held in 2018 according to procurement objects


The number of entities, registered in the Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement is continuously increasing. Only in 2018 over 3,300 new business-companies were registered within the System and overall number of registered suppliers totaled 38,248.

It should be mentioned that apart from business-companies, operating in Georgia, non-resident companies are also highly interested in the System. The number of these suppliers totaled 1,700 in 2018. In 2018, 61 contracts were executed with non-resident companies through tenders, net contract values of which exceeded 122 million GEL, amounting to 4% of the net volume of procurements, accomplished through tenders in Georgia.

Diagram N9: Values of contracts executed with resident and non-resident suppliers in 2018




In 2018 non-residents⁴ have won tenders in 34 different CPV categories. Of them, the largest number - 6 tenders was recorded in training service category (CPV 80500000), while in monetary terms, procurement category, where non-residents have won the largest-amount tenders was construction works CPV category (CPV 45200000). In total 4 contracts were executed in connection with this CPV category, while the net value of contracts amounted to 50 million. Compare: the value of contracts executed with resident suppliers for the same CPV category amounted to approximately 1.5 billion GEL, what is 30 times more than the volume of tenders won by non-resident suppliers.





Diagram N11: Distribution of non-resident suppliers according to regions


In 2018 the average number of bidders participating in tenders amounted to 2.1. The number of bidders according to supply of goods, construction works and services is distributed as follows:





Worth mentioning is also the distribution of announced tenders according to months. December-March period proves to be particular active.

Data do not cover GEO, DEP, CON and B2B tenders, cover trading with pricelist.

Additionally, it will be interesting to discuss certain procurement categories and statistics of contracting authorities. Specifically, special mention should first of all be made of the CPV categories with the highest rate of savings. According to these figures, there are no fundamental changes in statistics. The highest rate of savings again accounts for construction works CPV categories. See Table N5.

In 2018 Department of Roads of Georgia of the Ministry of Regional Development and Infrastructure of Georgia demonstrated the highest rate of savings through e-Tendering (over 50 million GEL). The leader is followed by the Tbilisi City Hall and Georgian Gas Transportation Company, LLC.

Also interesting is the average participation ratio according to procurement categories. As demonstrated by below tables (Table N7 and Table N8) average participation is rather high in certain procurement categories (e.g. building completion works – 3.48), whilst competition is rather low with regard to others, and there is even a lack of competition within certain categories.

For data to be statistically significant, the CPV categories are chosen with regard to which more than 100 tenders are announced per year.

E.g., 748 tenders were announced for pharmaceutical products, whilst competition rate for these tenders makes 1.57. The competition is obviously low in connection with telecommunication services and road transport services (1.3) as well. Detailed information is given below, in Table N8.

For data to be meaningful, the CPV categories are chosen, with regard to which more than 100 tenders are announced per year.

Worth mentioning is also the analysis of data of contracting authorities according to number of tenders and net amounts. As demonstrated by below Table, the largest number of tenders in 2018 was announced by the Tbilisi State Medical University, Tbilisi City Hall and the Ministry of Internal Affairs of Georgia.

IMPROVEMENTS TO LEGAL FRAMEWORK

As in previous years, major amendments were made to legal framework regulating public procurement in 2018. Particular mention should be made of the following reforms accomplished during this period:

- 1. Order N4 (7 March 2018) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency was issued On Amendment of Order N12 (14 March 2017) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency On Approval of the Procedure of Holding e-Tenders. As a result the procedures of holding e-tenders were further improved. Furthermore, a new code 85100000 Healthcare Services was added to CPV Codes subject to trading with a pricelist.
- 2. Order N7 (19 March 2018) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency was issued On Amendment of Order N19 (29 October, 2015) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency On Approval of the Procedure and Terms of Maintenance of the Black List. As a result, refusal of a bidder to execute a contract or otherwise demonstration of refusal seized to be grounds for registration in the Black List.
- 3. Order N8 (30 July, 2018) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency was issued On Approval of the Procedure and Terms and Conditions of Conducting Procurements by a Private Contracting Authority through Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement. These representatives of private sector are now allowed to use the Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement for the announcement of their tenders (for the so-called B2B relationships).
- 4. Order N9 (20 September, 2018) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency was issued On Amendment of Order N13 (17 August, 2015) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency On Approval of the Determination of Criteria of Simplified Procurement and Procedure of Conducting Simplified Procurements. As a result, the criteria for conducting simplified procurement due to urgent necessity were tightened.
- 5. Order N12 (27 November, 2018) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency was issued On Amendment of Order N12 (14 June, 2017) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency On Approval of the Procedure of Holding Simplified Tenders. As a result of the aforementioned amendment non-breaking down the costs will become the basis for disqualification of a bidder participating in a tender only when the breakdown is not presented at all or the number of positions of non-broken-down costs exceeds 1% of positions, subject to breaking down.

6. Order N14 (14 December, 2018) of the Chairman of the State Procurement Agency was issued On Approval of the Procedure and Terms and Conditions of Holding Consolidated Tenders and the unified procedure of holding consolidated tenders was approved irrespective of procurement objects.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION

Public procurement related disputes in Georgia are resolved by the independent authority, created on the basis of the Law of Georgia on Public Procurement - Board for Resolution of Public Procurement Related Disputes (Dispute Resolution Board).

The main goals of the Board is to resolve disputes arisen in the course of conduct of tender and contest procedures in the most expedient, efficient and fair manner.


The electronic module of appealing public procurement related disputes was added to the Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement in 2011. This module enables interested persons to electronically submit their complaints to Dispute Resolution Board with regard to alleged violations of tender and contest procedures without even leaving their offices.

The electronic module is public and any person, who is registered in the Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement, can see the complaints filed with regard to tenders, attached thereto documents and decisions made by the Board.

In 2018 Order N1 (8 February, 2018) of the Chairman of Public Procurement Agency was issued On Approval of the Rules of Procedure of the Dispute Resolution Board, which inter alia regulated the procedure of appointment, election and nomination of the Board members and also the procedure of reviewing complaints by the Board.

During the past year 1,040 complaints were filed with Dispute Resolution Board. Diagram N14 shows the number of complaints filed with the Board according to years.






Decrease of the number of complaints in 2018 as compared with 2016 and 2017 was mainly conditioned by reforms accomplished during the past years. Specifically, the amendments of 2017 regulated certain aspects related to Rules of Procedure of the Dispute Resolution Board. In particular, before these amendments tenders and contests could have been appealed free of charge and any person registered as a supplier in the Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement had access to appeal procedure. Because of this practice quite often the complaints were filed without any grounds, what undeniably obstructed the conduct of tenders and contests within timelines set for the procedures. Contracting authorities would fail to timely procure necessary goods, services and construction works, what considerably affected smooth operation of the contracting entities themselves, as well as expedient and efficient implementation of the necessary for the country projects in general.

As a result of accomplished reform the fee for filing a complaint was introduced amounting to 2% of the estimated value of the procurement, but maximum 500 GEL and minimum 100 GEL. Furthermore, the concept of "interested parties" was defined. Owing to this definition tender or contest terms and conditions can be appealed by any person registered in the System. And once the deadline for submission of tender or contest proposals is expired, the right to appeal is enjoyed only by a bidder participating in a tender/contest.

Most of the complaints filed in 2018 - 588 in total - were resolved in favor of the business sector (were fully or partially granted by the Board). Detailed distribution of the statuses of complaints are given on Diagram N15.

Diagram N15: Statistics of complaints filed with Dispute Resolution Board in 2018





Most of 1,040 filed complaints - 825 - concerned the decisions and acts of tender/contest commissions, while 215 complaints - tender terms and conditions. (See Diagram N16).

INITIATION OF CENTRALIZED PROCUREMENTS

In 2018 major reforms were accomplished in the light of conducting consolidated tenders. To ensure still more efficient disbursement of budget resources Resolution N446 of the Government of Georgia (29 August, 2018) provided for centralized procurement of certain types of procurement objects.

Among planned outcomes of the reform are the saving of budgetary resources, reduction of corruption risks, the number and volume of failed tenders and simplified tenders. The efficiency of administrative authorities will be increased, the risk of even theoretically possible corrupt transactions will be minimized, the quality of procurement objects will be improved (through unification and standardization), what ultimately will be beneficial for each and every citizen.

Based on the foregoing the new procurement objects were added to existing consolidated tenders. In total 61 consolidated tenders were announced in 2018 through the Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement, contract value of which tenders amounted to 290 million GEL.

In 2018 the volume of public procurements exceeded 4 (four) billion GEL, of which procurements for 3,7 billion GEL (93%) were effected through open e-tenders and simplified procurements and 290 million GEL (7%) were disbursed through consolidated tenders.

Before the announcement of these tenders, the market surveys were conducted in relevant fields and draft tender documents were prepared. Also the business meetings were arranged with the experts of relevant fields aiming at the alignment of procurements objects announced within the framework of consolidated tenders with international standards.

After the announcement of all the aforementioned tenders, tender proposals of lowest-price bidders were considered within each tender at selection-evaluation stage and protocols on announcement of relevant bidder(s) as winners were drafted. Additionally, a model contract to be executed within the framework of each consolidated tender was drafted in cooperation with winner suppliers, which model contract was then published on SPA official web-page.

Up to 6,000 permissions for fuel and papers, requested by contracting authorities in module, integrated into Consolidated Tenders Management System, were duly addressed in 2018 with due consideration of the regulations and recommendations developed by Tender Commission for Consolidated Tenders and each permission was granted relevant status.

Savings made in 2018 through consolidated tenders with regard to wholesale and retail prices of relevant procurement objects exceeded 45 million GEL. It should be noted that this amount does not cover savings made within the framework of consolidated tenders for mobile telephone services.

Currently, intensive analytical and research activities are underway for the identification of objects, procurement of which in a consolidated manner will be justified in the light of the principle of efficient disbursement of budgetary resources.

PRACTICE OF SIMPLIFIED PROCUREMENT

In 2018 the volume of contracts executed on the basis of simplified procurement amounted for 19% of the total procurement value, what is 5% less than similar showing for 2017. It should be mentioned, that 3,165 applications were received in 2018, what is again 3% less than the similar showing for the past year (3,271 applications in 2017).

Diagram N17: Distribution of applications, filed with SMP module according to their grounds





Diagram N18: Distribution of applications, filed with SMP module of the System according to their statuses



The above Diagram demonstrates, that 84% of the applications were accepted and rejected applications account for 16% of total number of applications. 2,648 consents were granted with regard to applications, filed in SMP module in 2018 (2,627 applications in 2017).

ADMINISTRATIVE INFRINGEMENTS AND COURT LITIGATIONS

In 2018 the SPA drew up 116 reports on administrative infringements against 370 persons. They were adequately addressed after being reviewed. Specifically, the facts were qualified according to applicable articles of the Code of Administrative Offences of Georgia and relevant written notices were circulated. The court has applied warning with regard to most of the cases on infringements, referred to the courts of law.

In total 683 legal proceedings were conducted in 2018. Overall 217 cases were reviewed by the courts of law during 2018, of which 116 cases concerned reports on administrative offences, drawn up by the SPA, 63 cases - the ordinances of the SPA Chairman on registration in the Black List, 24 cases concerned decisions of the Dispute Resolution Board (the court has satisfied claim in 1 case), 4 cases - consolidated tenders, 5 civil disputes on refund of the grant amount and 7 cases - refund of civil amount, submitted by the SPA. Also appealed was 1 Ordinance on the registration in the White List and the court of law upheld the SPA decision. 1 case concerned request for public information.

Furthermore, 3 permission acts, issued through SMP module were appealed, but proceedings were terminated on the basis of SPA submissions.

As already mentioned, of 1,040 complaints filed with Dispute Resolution Board, 24 decisions of the Board were appealed with the courts of law - these decisions make 2.3% of filed complaints. In 1 of 24 cases the court of first instance has upheld the claimant's claim, what was appealed with the Court of Appeals.


Also, in 2018 64 ordinances issued by the SPA Chairman with regard to the Black List were appealed. In all 64 cases the court of law has found, that the SPA act was lawful and upheld all the decisions.

MAINTENANCE OF THE WHITE LIST

One of the duties of the SPA is the maintenance of the register of qualified suppliers participating in procurements - the so-called "White List".

In total 127 decisions were made by the SPA in 2018 with regard to registration in the White List and extension of the registration. The detailed results are shown on Diagram N19.

Diagram N19: Distribution of decisions made in 2018 with regard to White List, according to their statuses






MAINTENANCE OF THE BLACK LIST

Along with the White List the SPA also maintains the register of mala fide suppliers - the so-called the Black List.

607 applications were filed with the SPA regarding registration of the suppliers in the Black List. In 403 cases the suppliers were registered in the Black List, 143 suppliers were given the warning. The detailed results of the decisions are given on Diagram N20.

It should as well be mentioned, that as a result of the reform, accomplished in 2018, a winner of a tender or contest, who refuses or otherwise demonstrates his refusal to sign a public procurement contract, will not be subject to registration in the Black List.

PERMANENT MONITORING

One of the main duties of the SPA is the regular monitoring of procurements conducted through electronic public procurement procedures, annual plans and simplified procurements.

During the period from the first of January until 31 December 2018, 14,814 tenders with "Contract Awarded" status, filtered according to various risk factors and criteria, and 639 tenders with statuses: "Tender Terminated", "Contract not Awarded," "No bids Received" were fully monitored via automatic messages of the System.

Furthermore, 8,400 tenders were monitored within the System with a view to establishing the adequacy of disqualification of bidders.

The SPA is also monitoring contracts awarded through contests and simplified procurement, presented through CMR module. In total 60 contracts awarded through contests and 52,688 contracts awarded through simplified procurement were monitored.

1,815 letters were sent to contracting authorities with regard to revealed violations. In 116 cases the reports on administrative infringement were drawn up and in other cases the SPA limited itself to written directions-recommendations.

DIDACTIC ACTIVITIES

The SPA Training Centre has been intensively working during the past year as well. Highly qualified experts of public procurement field are leading various training courses.

Apart from basic two-weeks course the Training Centre also conducted trainings according to three different programs:

- Novelties in Public Procurement for practicing procurement specialists;
- Topical Challenges and Novelties of Public Procurement for the Mayors of Georgian Municipalities;
- Course in Public Procurements and Training of Trainers for suppliers.





Only in 2018, 26 series of trainings and workshops were arranged at SPA Training Center under the participation of the trainees from all the regions of Georgia. Amongst the trainees were the procurement specialists of state agencies, 71 Municipalities and City Halls and city boards of self-governing cities, also the representatives of business-organizations. Of them, in total 315 (three hundred fifteen) certified trainees were retrained by the Training Centre. Furthermore, 5 thematic meetings were arranged with the Mayors and authorized representatives of Georgian Municipalities and 13 one-day trainings for certified public procurement specialists (369 trainees), 1 training for suppliers (15 trainees); overall 816 (eight hundred sixteen) trainees were retrained.

From 2014 till present 2,824 specialists, employed in procurement field were trained and certified by SPA Training Center, amongst them 1,327 trainees were from central government state agencies, 1,427 were the procurement specialists of local self-governance bodies and public and private law legal entities, founded thereby and 70 representatives - from business sector.

These figures do not include the trainees invited to workshops and various informational-consultancy-educational meetings - their overall number amounted to 358. Also one-day training courses were

taken by 369 trainees and 117 trainees from Municipality City Halls. In total the SPA Training Centre has retrained 3,668 trainees from October 2014 till December 2018.

Like past year, the Training Centre was intensively cooperating with foreign and local organizations in 2018 as well. They greatly contributed to the arrangement of joint trainings and workshops in the capacity of donors and partners.

PUBLICATIONS

With a view to familiarization and study of public procurement procedures the State Procurement Agency has updated and published several manuals and guidelines under the assistance of USAID – G4G program. In particular:

- 1. User Manual for Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement: CMR, ePlan, SMP and Ranking electronic modules;
- 2. User Manual for Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement: e-Tenders;
- 3. User Manual for Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement: Electronic Procedure of Procurement through Donor's resources and Electronic System of Grant Contest;
- 4. User Manual for Unified Electronic System of Public Procurement: System Functionality, User Registration and Profile Management;
- 5. Georgian legislation on Public Procurement;
- 6. Public Procurement: Guidelines and Best Practice.

COMMUNICATION WITH THE CUSTOMERS

In 2018 the document flow (number of incoming and outgoing letters) of the SPA amounted to 15,713 (in 2017 this figure made 17,478). Also 1,519 e-mails letters were received (info@procurement.gov.ge) and addressed (1,941 in 2017). Total 2,195 letters were archived in 2018 (2,031 in 2017).

Each and every interested person is entitled to get exhaustive and competent answer via SPA Citizen Hotline service. In total 17,781 calls were received and answered in 2018.

Integrated into the System Short Message Service (SMS) and system notices keep persons interested in public procurement constantly updated about the development of new services and modules. They can also receive information about tenders they are interested in. Only in 2018 approximately 46 million system notices and over 282 thousand SMSs were circulated.



INTENSIFICATION OF INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Like previous years, 2018 was also very rich and efficient for the State Procurement Agency in the light of intensification of international relations:

 During 2018 public - private dialogue format meetings were arranged in Batumi (15 June), Telavi (13 July), Gori (13 August), Kutaisi (10 September) within the framework of USAID project Governance for Growth in Georgia (G4G) and under the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce. Amongst of the participants of the meetings were the representatives of the SPA, Chamber of Commerce and local SMEs. The meetings aimed at raising the level of interest in public procurement of the entrepreneurs, operating in regions and provision for their maximal involvement in public procurement proceedings.



- The SPA intensively proceeds with the fulfillment of commitments undertaken within the framework of Deep and Comprehensive Free Trade Area (DCFTA).
- The SPA is still intensively participating in Public Expenditure and Financial Accountability (PEFA)
 program in cooperation with the WB, EU and the Ministry of Finance of Georgia. The data necessary
 for drafting Progress report were submitted in close cooperation with the Ministry of Finance, which
 data was duly reflected in Final Report.
- The SPA is intensively involved in Open Government Partnership (OGP) international initiative. On 17-19 July, 2018 Open Government Partnership fifth global summit was held in Tbilisi. The summit was attended by about 2,000 participants from 70 countries. A special session the summit was dedicated to the issues of public procurement and reforms implemented by State Procurement Agency of Georgia. At this session the State Procurement Agency presented Report on Fulfillment of Commitments within the framework of the OGP Action Plan 2018 together with the WB Group, EBRD and British representatives of Open Contracting Partnership (OCP) organization.





- The SPA is intensively involved in the implementation of Public Finance Management (PFM) reform. To this end the SPA regularly updates the Progress Report on the Implementation of Public Finance Management reform and submits it to the Ministry of Finance of Georgia.
- Also topical for the SPA is the implementation of Anticorruption Action Plan. To this end the SPA is cooperating with the Ministry of Justice, within the framework of which cooperation the report on the implementation of Anticorruption Strategy 2017-2018 Action Plan was drafted.
- On 25-27 April, 2018 the representatives of State Procurement Agency participated in the international conference, held in Seoul (South Korea) Public and Electronic Procurements 2018. The Conference was attended by the First Vice-Prime Minister of South Korea, Ministry of Finance, Minister for the Development of SME and other official persons. The main goal of this forum was global expansion of the access to public procurement markets. The participant countries shared their best practice in public procurement field, also discussed current processes and trends of public procurement field.



• On 8-10 May, 2018 annual international forum PRIMO – 14th Procurement, Integrity, Management and Openness Forum was held in Bucharest (Rumania) under the assistance of the WB, ADB, EBRD and other international financial institutions and organizations. The representatives of the State Procurement Agency also participated in this Forum.









On 25 - 29 June, 2018, the representatives of the State Procurement Agency visited Austria
on a business mission with a view to sharing experience and best practice in the field of
public procurement, also for the familiarization with the practice of harmonization of the EU
Directives. The meetings were arranged with Public Procurement Federal Agency of Austria,
Ministry of Finance, Federal Agency of Austria for Economic Cooperation and Development. The
representatives of the State Procurement Agency got familiarized with the centralized procurement
system of Austria in details.



- On 17 21 September, 2018, the management of the State Procurement Agency participated in the ADB annual International Conference Global Public Procurement Conference and 4th Conference of the Asia Pacific Public Electronic Procurement Network, held in Washington, DC (USA). Within the framework of this event the experience with the electronic system of public procurement, operating in Georgia, was shared and future plans were identified with regard to development of global strategy of implementation of digital technologies in public procurement field.
- On 16-17 December, 2018 the regular annual meeting of the EU-Georgia Association Committee in Trade Configuration was held in Brussels (Belgium). The State Procurement Agency presented its summative report on the fulfillment of commitments before the EU at this meeting. At the end of the Committee meeting the relevant protocol was signed, defining the next steps of mutual cooperation.
